### **Bob Bain**

Bob Bain is Associate Professor of Educational Studies and Associate Professor in the Department of History at the University of Michigan. He is the Director of the International Institutes and School of Education's World History and Literature Initiative and the faculty lead on the Big History Project. Before his time at the University of Michigan, he taught high school history and social studies for 26 years in the Cleveland area where he was a seven-time award winner for excellence in teaching.

### **Craig Perrier**

Craig is the High School Social Studies Curriculum and Instruction Specialist for Fairfax County Public schools in Virginia. He has been an online adjunct professor of history for Northeastern University and is currently a faculty member for the teacher certification program Educate VA. Previously, he taught for American Schools in Brazil and in public schools in Massachusetts. After leaving the classroom, Craig was the Coordinator for Curriculum and Instruction for Social Studies and History at Virtual High School and then the PH-12 Social Studies Coordinator for the Department of Defense Dependent Schools. He holds a M.A. in Global History, M.Ed. in Secondary Education, and is pursuing his doctorate in Educational Leadership.

### **Heather Streets-Salter**

Heather is Chair of the Department of History at Northeastern University. Her research focuses on world history, the structure of empires and colonial relationships, and the scholarship of pedagogy. She is the author of *World War One in Southeast Asia: Colonialism and Anti-Colonialism in an Era of Global Conflict* (2017), *Empires and Colonies in the Modern World* (2010) with Trevor Getz, *Martial Races: The Military, Martial Races, and Masculinity in British Imperial Culture, 1857-1914* (2004), and *Traditions and Encounters: A Brief Global History* (2006, 2009, 2012) with Jerry Bentley and Herb Ziegler. Her teaching at the graduate and undergraduate levels focuses on World History and the history of imperialism.

### **Molly Warsh**

Molly is an Assistant Professor of World History at the University of Pittsburgh, where she is also Associate Director of the World History Center and Chair of the Alliance for Learning in World History. She also serves on the Advisory Board of the bgC3-funded World History Project. She has participated in a variety of capacities in numerous professional development programs for teachers, both with the Gilder Lehrman Institute and the Virginia Geographic Alliance. She also has many years of experience working with students and teachers in educational programs for the K-12 classroom in Ithaca, Baltimore, and Pittsburgh, as well as through the National Humanities Center in North Carolina.
